School Pick Up

Given the number of students being picked up at the back of the school we now have a teacher supervising there from 3:30pm until 3:45pm. **School finishes at 3.30pm** and children should be picked up as close to 3.30pm as possible as we have staff meetings that begin at 3.45pm sharp. If you are going to be late please notify the office. Children not picked up by 3:45pm will need to wait at the office. We also request, as per the previous two newsletters that families use the side gate rather than jumping over the Urquart Street fence which poses a tripping and falling hazard.

Canteen



You will have received an Operoo notification inviting you to add your name to the roster to assist in our canteen on Wednesdays. You do not need to assist for the entire day or each week. Even if you add your name down once or twice a term in the morning or afternoon time slot, that would help keep our canteen be viable. Many thanks in advance for your support.

Home Reading

In order to get students to experience the benefits of reading, they need your support to develop the habit of reading at home to support progress and instill a love of books and literature. "Practice makes perfect." Just like in basketball, piano, and swimming, you

have to practice on a regular basis to improve your skills. These reading skills include accuracy, fluency, vocabulary,

decoding, and comprehension. You were your child's first teacher and taught them many important skills, including how to speak. Your child will experience the most success in reading when they read both at school and at home. Children learn about the importance and benefits of reading as they watch family members use reading and writing for everyday purposes. Reading for pleasure, sharing a story with your child, using a recipe, or reading street signs teaches them that reading is a useful skill in today's world. Reading with your child at home will help your child in all areas of school. Research shows the importance of reading on a daily basis in developing their use and understanding of vocabulary.

Your child learned to speak by being immersed in oral language, and the same applies for reading.

Dogs On Site



We understand that many families in our school community keep dogs as pets and that you love your pets, however, to ensure that our school remains a safe and inclusive place for everyone, pet dogs are not permitted on school grounds.

Our school community circumstances are diverse and include people that are allergic or uncomfortable around dogs. We are also conscious of the hazards that may be posed by dogs. We ask that families please leave their pet dogs at home or safely tether them outside school grounds when attending our school or school events. Pets are only permitted on site with expressed permission from the principal Thank you for your understanding and

Time in Lieu

Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic School EBA Time in lieu The new Catholic Education Multi-Enterprise Agreement 2022 (the Agreement) introduces a formal time in lieu (TIL) process for teachers. The Agreement provides that a principal may require a teacher to undertake work and attend a school activity outside the normal hours of attendance (i.e., in excess of the 38 hours or normal hours for a part-time teacher) and when this occurs, it will attract TIL. Principals are to prepare for the accrual and acquittal of TIL through their annual planning process. The timing of the acquittal of TIL is at the discretion of the principal, having regard to the operational needs of the school and causing the least disruption to the educational program of the school. Principals can acquit TIL by designating days during the year on which all staff and students are not required to attend school. For 2023, there are opportunities to acquit TIL for the whole school on the following days: 2 October with an additional day TBA. We are in the process of allowing TIL for staff who have attended camps.

Camps from 2024 Onwards

TIL requirements significantly increase the cost of camps which necessitates us to review our current camp programs. As communicated in earlier newsletters, we are currently reviewing camp models that are sustainable and affordable. We are currently exploring the most workable option which will mean that students will still have the opportunity to go on camp twice during their primary years at St Ambrose.

We are looking at running a two-day/one-night year three and four camp in term four which would be an adventure camp and a three-day/two-night year 5-6 camp in term one, probably at Philip Island. The Phillip Island Camp would be an environmental and teambuilding camp, where students would enjoy learning, exploring, and deepening their knowledge about natural habitats. They would participate in many activities including an exploration of coastal landscapes, paddle boarding led by experienced instructors, The Penguin Parade, Churchill Island, The Koala Conservation Reserve, and a number of fun-filled activities.

This will mean that students would go on camp either in years three and five or in years four and six.

The benefits of this model are:

-Larger numbers keep the costs lower.
-All students in the classes will go together allowing continuity of learning.
-Cost-effective as we do not need to engage CRT staff to work with the students back at school.

The bus left at 8:30 and before we knew it we were at the front gate of Scienceworks. We walked down to the old pumping station where we learned a lot about prosthetics. We met the amazing Paralympian and medical researcher Bree Mellberg who went from walking to a wheelchair after a trampolining accident then she became a Basketball Paralympian. Bree shared many aspects of her life as a Paralympian and her many great achievements in her sport and as a medical researcher where she is working on cancer research. Soon after we heard from Clair Hartmann and Isif Mohammed engineeers from The Bionic Institute who presented details of the bionic ear and eye.

After having a lunch break we were asked to design ways to help and enhance humans. After preparing a design brief based on a scenario. We had to build a prototype of our design. We had a huge amount of different resources to choose from. Most of us worked on enhancing and modifying prosthetics to help people with disabilities. One of our group even designed a prosthetic leg for Stumpy the story dog, another group designed a saddle for horse riders that couldn't use their legs.

The day was a great success.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) On School Students with Disability

What is the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data?

Schools must now complete the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) every year. It counts the number of students who receive additional adjustments or "help" at school because of a disability. The NCCD helps governments plan for the needs of students with disability.

Who is counted in the data collection?

To count a student in the NCCD, schools must think through some key questions:

- Is the student getting help at school so that they can take part in education on the same basis as other students?
- Is the help given because of a disability? The word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability</u> <u>Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA) and it can include many students.
- Has the school talked to you or your child about the help that they provide?
 Has the school kept records about the help they provide, the student needs and the reasons that the student needs this help? The school will need to keep copies of tests, student work, assessments, records of meetings, medical reports or other paperwork and information about how the student's learning is moving along over time.

Once the school decides that the student should be counted in the NCCD, they then choose a disability group and one of four levels of help that has been given to the student.

What does the word 'disability' mean in the NCCD?

In the NCCD the word 'disability' comes from the <u>Disability Discrimination Act 1992</u> (DDA). There are four types of disability that the school can choose from: sensory, cognitive, social-emotional and physical.

Many students that need help at school can be counted in the NCCD. For example, students with learning problems, e.g. specific learning disability or reading difficulty (sometimes called dyslexia), health problems (e.g. epilepsy or diabetes), physical disability (e.g. cerebral palsy), vision/hearing loss and social-emotional problems (e.g. selective mutism, Autism Spectrum Disorder, anxiety).

Letters from doctors or specialists can be very helpful for schools as they plan how to support students with their learning. Schools do not need to have these letters before they can count a

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student in NCCD. Teachers can use all that they know about the student's learning and the records that they have collected over time to decide if a student can be counted in the NCCD.

What sort of help does the school give students?

Students need different types of help at school. Some students need a little help sometimes while other students need a lot of help nearly all the time. The type of help given depends on the needs of the student. The help can include changes to the school buildings or grounds (e.g. ramps or things like special desks or chairs), extra teacher help in classes, special learning programs, changes to the work they give the student or extra adult help.

How will the NCCD be different this year?

All schools have been counting students in the NCCD since 2015. The government will use the NCCD data as part of the funding to schools.

What will the school need to know about my child for the NCCD?

Schools work together with families to understand the needs of each child. It is helpful if families give their child's teacher a copy of any letters or reports they have. The letters or reports will help the school understand the child and the help that they might need. Letters from doctors, psychologists, speech pathologists, doctor, and occupational therapists etc. can be very helpful for schools. These reports along with information that the teacher has (i.e. school based tests, your child's work and learning plans) helps the school to understand and meet your child's needs.

What happens to the NCCD data? Who will have the NCCD information?

Each school principal must check the NCCD data in August of each year. The school will give the information to the Catholic Education Office. The school will work with the Catholic Education Office to make sure that the NCCD data is OK before they give the data to the government. The government will not be given the names of any students or any letters or records. Please ask your school for their privacy policy if you need to know more.

Does the school need me to agree with them about counting my child in the NCCD?

Amendments were made to the <u>Austrolian Education Act 2013</u> and <u>Austrolian Education Regulation</u> 2013). Schools do not need you to agree to let them count a child in the NCCD. You cannot ask the school not to count your child.

Where can I find out more?

Please contact your child's school if you have further questions about the NCCD and/or refer to the national <u>NCCD Portal</u>.

GIVING YOUR SCHOOL & SAY ON THE FUTURE OF EDUCATION

You may be aware that the Australian Government has established an Expert Panel to inform the next National School Reform Agreement.

This week the Expert Panel is releasing a survey to get the views of teachers, parents and students.

This is all about ensuring those directly involved in the education system get a say in how we make it better and fairer.

Survey participants will be able to have their say on range of issues including:

- Improving education outcomes
- Supporting student mental health and wellbeing, and
- Attracting and retaining teachers.

The Expert Panel, led by Dr Lisa O'Brien AM, will report to Education Ministers at the end of October on the practical reforms that should be tied to funding in the next National School Reform Agreement.

The survey is available to complete here and will be open until Friday, 23 June 2023

I encourage you to share this with staff, school council and the school community.

I would also welcome the opportunity to meet with you to discuss how the Government can create a better and fairer education system.
