

### **Message from Ms Phillips**

"Happy are those whose strength is in you, who have set their hearts on pilgrimage" Psalm 85:5

With gratitude I am spending a couple of weeks on a journey within and without... a time to nourish the soul! Beginning in the ancient city of Athens and finishing in Izmir Turkey following some of the path taken by St Paul (in reverse order) so many centuries ago.

Paul founded the church in Corinth and we were able to stand in the place where he used to preach to the Corinthians. From there, he moved on to Ephesus, a city on the west coast of today's Turkey, and then to Caesarea and Antioch to complete his mission. Paul later returned to Ephesus on his third missionary journey and stayed there for three years. During his time in Ephesus, St. Paul set one of the most well known religious routes in the world. This pilgrimage I am part of with a group of fellow ONWZ principals, follows his footsteps. We will visit Ephesus in a few days.

Paul is a key figure in Christian religion. Even though he wasn't one of Jesus' 12 Apostles, he spread the word of Christianity more than anybody else and for this reason he "Apostle of the Nations".


St Paul's journey in Greece has taken us through some of the most beautiful places that touch not only believers but also anyone who loves history. Our travels immerse us in a combination of pilgrimage as well as experiencing the sights of this magnificent country.

Last Monday we began our sacred journey stepping into an ancient faith tradition, joining countless saints and ordinary people who have gone before us on pilgrimage.

Our pilgrimage began with an exploration of Athens and its ancient and sacred sites. Greece of today continues on, buzzing around the ancient ruins and holy spaces.

As we follow the footsteps of St Paul we reflect on our beliefs, faith rituals and traditions, as well as modern day connections and how this applies to our own lives and that of our school communities.

Together we have shared silence, prayer and scripture at the Acropolis, the place where St Paul preached to the Athenians. It is here the Acts 17:15–34 is inscripted on







After visiting Ancient Greek sites, Acropolis, Corinth and the Monastery of Hosios Loukas, Thessaloniki, Philippi and Kavala we now have a taste of what Greece was like when Jesus walked our earth and Paul spread the word of God.

Paul was a modern day influencer of his time. He travelled Greece and Turkey sharing our faith with others. Some were keen to listen and others were not. We have been fortunate to visit many of these places along with many other people from all around the world.

We have been in awe of the artefacts, mosaics, and paintings that give us a sense of what life was like in Paul's time and tell the scripture stories to all those who visit. We have seen these messages of the past echoing through the beauty in each of these places. We have been in awe of the creativity, patience and dedication the artisans of the day generated to make such beautiful spaces for worship and for the community to gather.

We have been extremely fortunate to have been gifted a sense of Paul's vision and mission to spread the good news of his friend Jesus Christ to all those who he thought needed it.

Today we travelled from Samos to Patmos by boat, as Paul would have done. It is here where we will visit where John wrote the Book of Revelation. Patmos is called the 'Jerusalem of the Aegean' due to the overwhelming atmosphere of the island during the great celebrations of Christianity. We look forward to learning more and reflecting on our faith in these glorious places.

At this point, for me the most moving experience I have had was in Phillipi where Paul baptised Lydia who was his first convert. We renewed our vows of baptism in this blessed place and I said a prayer for our St Ambrose community. "Faith is not the clinging to a shrine, but an endless pilgrimage of the heart." – Abraham Joshua Heschel.

Catholics see pilgrimage as an opportunity to strengthen their faith. We will continue to pray for you all and ask that you pray for us as we continue to witness the journey of St Paul.

I would like to congratulate our students who recently made their first Eucharist and all of our classes on their progress this term. I will share some points of interest with our classes after the Thankyou to our incredible staff and you our families and community for your contribution to our great school this past ten weeks. May you all enjoy the term break and I look forward to seeing you in term four.



This photo was taken at HOSIOS LOUKAS MONASTERY which is west out of Athens. It is a remarkable Byzantine Monastery of Hosios Loukas, built in the 11th century on the slopes of Mt Helikon. In 1990 UNESCO included this site on their World Heritage List. The Churches, crypt and surrounds housed amazing frescoes and mosaics. This ancient monastery is an architectural masterpiece and most beautiful spiritual sanctuary. I said a prayer for you all in this holy place.

Gospel Reflection: Mark 8:27-35

This passage does more than challenge the apostles to define Jesus. It challenges us, here and now, to make a declaration of faith, to believe, to act - not just think about what Christ means and who he is, but to say it.

To make a declaration of faith.

But how do we do that? Jesus offered an answer many may not want to hear. "Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me."

Among other things, this passage affirms, once again, that Jesus never offered his followers the easy way out. What he was offering, instead, required sacrifice, hardship, suffering - carrying a cross, bearing a burden, even to the point of persecution and death.

For many Christians around the world today, the cross might involve punishment or imprisonment, possibly even death, for declaring oneself a follower of Christ. But for most of us, the cross is very different, almost abstract. It isn't necessarily made of wood.

To be a Christian can mean carrying the cross of mercy - forgiving others and praying for them, when it is so much easier and gratifying to hate.

It can mean carrying the cross of patience - living with a thousand small setbacks and annoyances to perform acts of kindness, generosity or love for another.

Maybe it means carrying the cross of self-sacrifice – caring for others who might hunger for food or friendship or who yearn simply for someone to lend a hand or lend an ear.

In ways large and small, we are compelled to face the central question at the heart of Mark's Gospel - "Who do you say that I am?" - and answer it not only with words, but with our lives. We are called to do nothing less than to proclaim the love of Christ.

Whether we realize it or not, that charge lies - literally - at the center of the Gospel. It should also be at the center of our lives.

# **First Communion Reflection**

Over the past two weekends the Grade 4 children from St. Ambrose Parish have been making their First Eucharist. Father John spoke to many of them about a young boy called Blessed Carlo Acutis, who was born in 1991. Carlo was a normal young boy, very much like the children in our Parish. Carlo enjoyed doing all the things that any teenage boy did. He was really talented with computers and, through his work cataloguing all the Eucharistic miracles in the world, he tried to show people "that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist".


When he was 15, Carlo was diagnosed with an aggressive form of Leukaemia. He still thought of others more than himself as seen when he wouldn't wake his tired mother just because he was in pain. Carlo died in 2006, a week after he was diagnosed. What people didn't know at that time was that Carlo not only spread the faith with his online work, but he gave a lot of time and his own money to help the poor and homeless throughout Milan where he grew up. Next year Carlo, though only 15 when he died, will become a saint.

People have the misconception that young people and teenagers cannot make a difference in this world. Blessed Carlo Acutis demonstrated that, with God's help, they can. Our children, in receiving their First Eucharist, have shown an acceptance of God's love and help in all their endeavours. Carlo Acutis was born in London in 1991 to Italian parents and grew up in Milan. From a very early age, people felt that Carlo was a particularly special boy. Carlo showed a great devotion to Jesus in the Eucharist and to Our Lady, even though his parents didn't practice their faith.

Growing up, Carlo was lively, popular and cheerful. He wasn't always the most prepared for class and he often distracted others during boring lessons, but when this was brought to his attention by his teachers, he stopped completely.

A bright lad, Carlo finished middle school with distinction. He had a particular gift for kindness. He stood up for those who were picked on by others because they were different. He wanted his friends to live good virtuous lives, and he challenged the other students in his class to value the gift of modesty and he stood up for the gift of life. Above all, he wanted his friends to know and love God like he did. Carlo was his own man - he wasn't bothered by what other people thought about him.

Young Carlo didn't just talk to his schoolmates only about prayer. He was a normal teenager, who loved joking and laughing, hanging out with his friends, making videos with them; he loved quizzes, flying kites, watching action films, playing soccer and being on his Playstation too. He loved Pokemon and Super Mario. He loved his dogs, cats and even his goldfish. His friends knew Carlo was always there for them, especially if they were going through a hard time in their families. Carlo also volunteered as a catechist for younger children preparing for their confirmation.



Carlo was really talented with computers. He taught himself to design websites and could understand computers as well as college graduates. He helped to create a website for his school and his parish, but his big project brought together two of his passions: technology and the Eucharist. Carlo wanted to catalogue all the Eucharistic miracles in the world, and so he began researching and collecting information from all over the world, and travelling to various shrines with his parents when he could to take photos. He wanted people to know that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist. The website he started is still on the internet today!

When Carlo was just 15, he got really sick with a very aggressive form of Leukaemia, and he knew he didn't have long to live. He offered up all his pain and suffering "for the Pope and the Church, so as not to undergo Purgatory and enter heaven directly."

Even though he was really sick in hospital, he still thought more of other people, and nurses noticed that he didn't want to wake his mother when he was in pain: "She is very tired as well, and she will only worry even more about me."

Carlo died on 12 October 2006, just one week after being diagnosed, and was buried in Assisi where he loved to visit. A huge crowd of people came to his funeral. What many people didn't know about Carlo was that as well as his online work in spreading the faith, he was also giving up a lot of time and his own money to help the poor and homeless, bringing food and sleeping bags to people throughout Milan.

Carlo, our milennial saint, was beatified on 10 October 2020, and showed us that holiness and even sainthood are possible for teenagers and young people today, in the ordinary circumstances of everyday life. Saints can wear Nike and jeans, play computer games and surf the net too!

The training will be held on Saturday October 5th, 9.30-11am in the church


Copies of the code of conduct will be available to sign on the day as well.
